



Some Suggestions to Help You Stay Sane When Switching Style Guides


The session addresses the following questions:



The Care and Feeding of Graduate Student Writers

All writers have needs, but graduate students seem to have more than most. By the time they contact you for editing, some feel isolated or near the end of their rope. They may latch onto you as a mentor or, in some cases, as their last hope to achieve graduation or to move on in their profession. Talk about pressure and stress—on both sides!

Yet, while challenging, working with graduate students under these circumstances can still be enormously satisfying—for both them and you. In this workshop, I share practical communication strategies to work successfully with these clients. Through discussion and hands-

Leveraging ChatGPT to Become a Better Editor

One of the numerous questions and concerns surrounding ChatGPT is whether or not it can "replace" human editors. Whichever side you choose in this debate, it's undeniable that knowledge of ChatGPT has now become a skill of its own. Developing this very skill will be the focus of this session.

The speaker will discuss best practices of accepting the tool and adopting it correctly and efficiently to get the most out of it and become a better editor. Attendees will learn how they can use ChatGPT as an assistant while dealing with complex texts and maximise editorial output through its merits. We will then deconstruct the mechanism of the tool: understand its limitations, discuss ways to avoid consequent errors, and strategically get the best results.

Creating and Using Editing Checklists

Editors are familiar with style guides and style sheets. But for large multi-document projects spanning years and involving dozens of authors and multiple editors, an editing checklist is a further tool that can be used to both help deliver consistent edits across documents and log where edits have been applied.

Editing checklists are tables that, like style sheets, capture the correct project terms (e.g., "Base Case" vs. "Baseline Case"); spelling and capitalization (e.g., "data set" vs. "dataset"); and other style conventions (e.g., using double quotes instead of single quotes).

Unlike style sheets, editing checklists provide a way to systematically track the checked items in a collection of project documents and record the date the last check was done. Editing checklists also typically list incorrect variants that may appear in the documents and how they should be corrected. These features allow editing checklists to capture details that would overwhelm a style sheet and allow multiple

Pitfalls, Promise, and Productivity

Can Language Control Thought?

We all assume that the words we choose can affect how people think of things—in fact, writers of advertising, marketing, and political speeches rely on it. And we know that the words a language has seem to affect how its speakers think of the world: speakers of different languages may disagree on whether two things are the same color, for instance. We also know that different languages grammatically highlight different aspects of reality, which we might expect would influence how people think. But the euphemism-to-dysphemism treadmill, seen for example in terms related to disabilities, shows that changing the words doesn't reliably change the world. And while there have been various proposals that the grammar of a language can affect how people think of and act on the world—for instance, that the verbal tenses of a language can influence people's tendency to plan—linguists have always been ready and willing to rebut them. So exactly how far does it go? Let's have a look.
